




Cultural Diversity Week 2025

SPOTLIGHT ON TEACHING AND LEARNING







Our foundation students have settled into full weeks of school and are showing fantastic learning behaviours across all three classrooms. Look at some of the writing they are already producing!



The junior students have begun targeted Systematic Synthetic Phonics (SSP) lessons. Students move across the junior classes to ensure they have phonics teaching targeted at their specific needs. You may also notice that these children also know 'cued articulation' which is a cue they make with their hand representing the way sounds are made.





Our years 3 and 5 students have been working through the NAPLAN testing sessions last week and into this week. The teachers have prepared them very well which means they are able to give their best effort and show what they truly are capable of.



ART ROOM NEWS LOU COOPER

The middle students finished their stunning Bronwyn Bancroft inspired art pieces last week. For this 3 week unit, we looked at Bronwyn's book "Patterns of Australia", a beautiful book which allows the reader to see the Australian landscapes and habitats in "patterns" as seen through the lens of the author/ artist herself.

The pieces the students created have 3 layers. Firstly, students chose which landscape resonated with them (they could either pick one from the book or choose their own landscape ie, family farm, local beach etc). They painted 3 watercolour pages.

Week 2 the students created their animals from one of the painted papers, decorated them and stuck on their main back layer.

Lastly, the students created their repeating patterns, and re created the animals peaking out from the layers just like in the book.

These are on display on the board outside of MO in the BER building if you want to check them out.

Foundations

Foundation students have settled really well this year. They have done a little work on cybersafety and which information is ok to share and which is not. They are currently looking at collecting, sorting, and recognising different types of patterns in data and how they can represent it using pictures, symbols or diagrams. We have been outside to collect things (data) and put those things in groups - showing how our data can be represented. It has been a lot of fun so far and they are doing great work. They are going to move into basic coding using the Cubetto Robots in the next few weeks.

Juniors

Junior students have started looking at the Acceptable User Agreement and since then have been brushing up on their typing skills, touch typing at the start of every lesson. We then moved into Microsoft Word and have learned how to highlight text using shortcuts, create lists using bullet points and numbers - also discussing when we might use each style of list. More recently they have learned how to copy, paste and undo using the shortcuts of CTRL C, V and Z. The repetition each week is paying off, especially for the year 1 students who are doing a great job remembering their usernames and passwords.

Middles

Middle students have been doing very similar work to the juniors but on a slightly more involved level. They start each lesson focussing their typing skills but are not allowed to progress to the next level unless they can demonstrate proficiency with their hands covered by a cloth. Some are now choosing to do all their typing with their hands covered to further their skills in touch typing. They have been in Word as well, using more shortcuts to highlight text, such as CTRL + SHIFT and then up, down, back and forward arrows. They are creating text with borders, artwork and looking at shading. We have also looked at justifying our text left, right, in the middle or all justified so they can see how each might be used and how it makes their text look. They are gearing up to do some coding using Minecraft next term so that should be exciting.

Seniors

Senior students started in the same manner as the middles. Each lesson begins with 5-10 minutes of touch typing and the proficiency test of the cloth. They began the year with the Acceptable User Agreement and then moved on to doing their work in Google. They have learned how to create a folder in their own Google Drive, create a new google doc, how to share it with a partner and also unshare it. We created tables in a Google Doc and then they shared it with 3-4 other people, who then had to fill in information such as their favourite singer, youtuber or any other category they came up with. There were 10 categories of their choosing. There was a lot of excited chatter in the room while they worked collaboratively to do the task. These last few weeks will be spent getting them ready to start 3D printing in term 2 as they learn how to manipulate shapes in Bambu Studio, create text and set up the 3D printers to suit their task. They are really excited to move onto this stage of their learning.

3D Print a Car Group

The group meets every Tuesday lunch time and is getting ready to start designing their cars based on the 2025 Quantum Field guide which has just been released. It's great that we are in a position to enter this statewide competition, and we are hoping to do well.

Cubeez Trading

As the promotion has finished at Woolies, so have the lunchtime trading sessions. Every Wednesday lunchtime I opened the room up for students to trade and complete sets. It was great to see this happen in a healthy and monitored environment. I still have lots of seconds so if you are still trying to complete a set, get your child to pop in and see me and I may be able to help.

WORLD DOWN SYNDROME DAY FRIDAY MARCH 21 EWEN JONDAHL – ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL & DISABILITY INCLUSION COORDINATOR



Dear Parent/Guardian

World Down Syndrome Day is celebrated on March 21 each year.

This year, Sale Primary School are using the 'Lots of Socks theme' created by Down Syndrome International to celebrate World Down Syndrome Day on Friday 21 March.

On this day, we ask that your child wears socks of their choice to school. They can be bright, colourful, short or long, the choice is endless!

(Please - nothing offensive or degrading).

During the day, teachers will be discussing what makes us all unique, as well as Down syndrome. We will talk about inclusion and how we can all help each other to feel included.

Please find below a brief definition of Down syndrome as a reference, should you want to discuss the day with your child.

Down syndrome is a genetic condition — it is not an illness or disease. It occurs because of an extra chromosome. Our bodies are made up of millions of cells.

There are 23 pairs of chromosomes, or 46 chromosomes, in every cell. Down syndrome is caused by the occurrence of an extra chromosome, chromosome 21.

(Down syndrome is also known as trisomy 21.) People with Down syndrome then have 47 chromosomes in their cells instead of 46. This results in a range of physical characteristics, health and development indications and some level of intellectual disability. Down syndrome is usually recognisable at birth and confirmed by a blood test. It was named after Dr John Langdon Down who first described it. Although we know how Down syndrome happens, we do not yet know why it happens. Down syndrome occurs at conception, across all ethnic and social groups and to parents of all ages. It is nobody's fault, there is no cure and it does not go away.

People with Down syndrome may find doing some activities more challenging but, just like everyone else, people with Down syndrome will continue to learn, and are good at some things and not others.

We look forward to celebrating World Down Syndrome Day together.

Educational Assessments

School psychologists can conduct educational assessments with students to investigate learning difficulties. This involves using standardised tests that measure a student's intellectual functioning (thinking abilities) and academic skills, both of which impact learning at school.

When to seek an educational assessment?

If your child is showing persistent difficulties in:

- reading and spelling, e.g., slow, choppy, effortful reading, frequently mispronouncing and misspelling words
- writing e.g., scrappy or illegible handwriting, poor pencil grip and control, poor letter formation, sizing and spacing, writing is highly effortful and slow
- maths e.g., understanding and remembering numbers, maths rules and maths concepts

Other signs include trouble with problem-solving, memory, keeping up with peers, or expressing a strong dislike or anxiety for reading, writing or maths, and avoiding them at all costs.

If you would like your child considered for an assessment, speak to their teacher about a possible referral.

Since it began in 2005, more than 4.5 million young readers have taken part and together read more than 63 million books!



FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors. Excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works while sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are a part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$150 for primary school students
- \$250 for secondary school students

HOW TO APPLY

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from the website below.

If you applied for CSEF at your child's school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- new student enrolments; your child has started or changed schools this year.
- changed family circumstances; such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing this year.

Check with the school office if you are unsure.
